PI CHAPTER HALL OF FAME: CECIL D. MAYNARD

Brother Cecil D. Maynard graduated from Garber High School in 1940 and attended Oklahoma A&M from 1940 until 1944. At Oklahoma A&M, he was enrolled in ROTC. In 1944, he was called into active duty in the U.S. Army to serve as a 2nd Lieutenant in World War II. He served in the European Theater and was involved in the landing at Normandy.

As a 2nd Lieutenant in the infantry he saw a lot of action. The shelf life of platoon leaders was not very long during and after the invasion, he finally smeared mud over the bars on his helmet so the German snipers could not pick him out so quickly. He lost five messengers that were assigned to him during combat.

He had intended to be a veterinarian, but while in combat, he got his arm and hand injured so badly that he had to give up that dream. When he returned to college, he changed his major to agriculture economics, which turned out to be a major gain for the field.

While at Oklahoma A&M, Maynard was initiated by Pi Chapter in 1941, initiate 317. He served as noble ruler and secretary while at Pi Chapter. Maynard also served as the State FFA president, which enabled him to recruit some outstanding men for our Chapter. While at Oklahoma A&M, he was active in Phi Kappa Phi, Alpha Zeta, Phi Eta Sigma and Blue Key. He was an outstanding leader for Pi Chapter and the College of Agriculture.

Maynard served four terms on the Pi Chapter Alumni Board and served six years as vice president of the Board during those terms. He received a bachelor of science in animal science in 1946 and a master of science in agricultural economics in 1958 from Oklahoma A&M.

Maynard was an extension economist at Oklahoma A&M and Oklahoma State University. He and his wife, Martha, reside in Stillwater, Okla. They have five grown children: Cecylia, Carla, Kent, Lloyd and Dan. Carla was one of the original Rho mates while at OSU.

Maynard's professional career began in 1947 when he was with the Veterans Agricultural Training Program. He was in this position until 1956, at which time he began his long and distinguished

career as extension economist at OSU. He authored or co-authored over 100 publications and papers for use by Oklahoma agriculture producers, lenders and tax practitioners.

Along with D.B. Jefferies, Maynard started programs that are still meaningful and useful today. He traveled the state teaching farmers and ranchers how to make better management decisions. They founded the Farmers Tax Institute, which became the main Income Tax training platform for tax preparers statewide. Along with Glen Laughlin, he authored an estate planning bulletin that became the most requested extension bulletin in history. Maynard mentored all of the area agriculture economists coming into the extension service, and his teaching still has a profound effect on Oklahoma agriculture producers.

Maynard was active in the American Farm Economics Association, American Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers, Chamber of Commerce and American Legion. He truly is one of the greatest generation and humbly one of the greatest contributors to Oklahoma State University and Pi Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho.

AGR ATHLETICS ON THE RISE

The AGR Men's B League basketball team had quite a season this semester. Games began partway through this spring semester and finished during the first week of April. The AGR B League team had a tremendous year, winning four games and losing only one. They were only a half-court, last second, buzzer beater away from finishing the regular season undefeated. The AGR team was up by one with just seconds remaining as the opposing team inbounded the ball from mid-court. AGR senior, Will Osborn, knocked the ball loose as the opposing team was hurrying to get a last second shot. The ball handler regained control of the ball, took one more dribble and heaved up a half court prayer which then went in as time expired, giving the AGR team their only loss of the season.

With that one loss, the AGR team entered playoffs as the sixteenth seed out of over 100 teams. Week after week, the AGR team made their way through the tournament bracket unscathed, with yet another win under their belt. They made it to the Men's B League Final Four, which is only one win away from playing in the championship game in Gallagher-Iba Arena, before their luck changed. They ended up losing that game before they made it to the championship, but they can still claim the title of one of the four best Men's B League teams at Oklahoma State University. Team members include seniors Dillon Sparks, Alex Yauk and Will Osborn; juniors Nick Storm and Dane Caldwell; sophomores Luke Broadbent, Ernesto Rios and Clark Bixler; and freshman James Semrad.

COWBOY KITCHENS

AGR senior and former OSU Student Government Association vice president, Derek Barchenger, has represented AGR well all across campus during his time in office. The SGA vice president position is a very distinguished office. During his time in office, Barchenger laid the ground floor to implement a very important project for Oklahoma State University and the community of Stillwater. This program is called Cowboy Kitchens. Barchenger became more knowledgeable about this program after visiting Baylor University during the SGA Big 12 Conference.

“The theme for the conference was leadership through service,” Barchenger said. “The students at Baylor presented us with many different ways that they actually help the city of Waco, which has a high population of people that live below the poverty line and people that are homeless.”

Cowboy Kitchens allows students to recycle leftover food from campus dining and deliver it to those in the community who need it. Currently, the leftover food from OSU campus dining is thrown away. Barchenger said giving that food to people in need would be a great opportunity for OSU students to serve the community of Stillwater, and he has begun the process of starting a Cowboy Kitchen here at OSU.

“If we could help feed these people by just not throw-

ing away leftover food, then Cowboy Kitchens benefits Stillwater,” Barchenger said.

Oklahoma ranks as the fifth hungriest state in the nation, according to the Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma. The Mission of Hope, located at 1804 S. Perkins Road, would potentially be one recipient of food donations from Cowboy Kitchen once it gets started. Holly Smith, program director for the Mission of Hope, said the mission doesn’t provide meals to the general public. Instead, people currently living at the mission eat there, but they prepare their own food, she said. Smith said the organization usually gets donations from businesses around the city, but occasionally campus groups donate after an event.

Terry Baker with OSU Campus Dining said the program is so new, many of the details are still in the works. Whether all campus dining establishments will contribute leftovers to the program or just a select few is still undecided. Baker said where and how food will be delivered is also still being decided.

“It is focused on taking the food that University Dining Services would normally throw away and putting it to a better use,” Barchenger said. “The implementation of the program is in the beginning stages, but applications to volunteer in delivering food are available.”

BROTHER CONTINUES TRADITION

Over the past year, Brother Wyatt Swinford has been representing Oklahoma State University as Pistol Pete. When he was selected last April to portray the icon of the university, he said, “I feel so honored to carry on this tradition for OSU and for AGR.” A year later his sentiments have not changed. “Not only have I been able to represent all of the Cowboy family, but I have been allowed to be a part of the long list of brothers who have toted the big head and pistol,” he said. Swinford was addressing the fact that there have been a large number of brothers who have been Pistol Pete, and in several instances Pistol Pete was portrayed by an AGR for consecutive years.

Pistol Pete is based on the real life character Frank “Pistol Pete” Eaton who was a U. S. Deputy Marshall in Indian Territory, Kan., and Texas. As one of the two Pistol Petes for 2010-2011, Swinford attended over 250 events, making appearances at OSU sporting events, banquets, weddings and birthday parties.

Swinford said he was very fortunate to do an appearance for AGR alumnus Brother Brian Leedeey at his wedding

this spring. Coincidentally, Leedeey traces back to be Swinford’s seven-grand Big Brother. “It was really an awesome experience to be able to do a wedding for not only a brother, but a brother in my family of the chapter,” Swinford said.

Swinford graduated in May 2011, receiving a degree in agribusiness. He plans to attend law school. He is interested in pursuing his LLM after receiving his Juris Doctorate. He has his eyes set on the University of Arkansas’ Master of Ag Laws degree.

He said his experiences as Pistol Pete will help him in the future. “Being Pistol Pete has taught me to serve others even when it is not an easy task. Many times I would be doing an appearance for little kids at hospitals, and an hour with that 45 pound head on would lead to excruciating pain. Even so, you learn to stick with things and to help others even when it isn’t easy.”

Demuth's son, Brent, followed in his father's footsteps by joining AGR at Oklahoma State University. Demuth served on the AGR Alumni Board for one term during the late 1980s.

Randy Gordon is the son of Ivan and Marilyn Gordon of Seiling, Okla. He is a junior majoring in agribusiness pre-law. After graduating in May 2012, he plans to attend the University of Oklahoma College of Law.

UNDERGRADUATE MEMBERS PROPOSE ANNEX

This spring, undergraduate members put together a proposal to acquire an annex for the AGR house. The reasoning behind this proposal is due to the increased emphasis placed on campus involvement and philanthropy hours.

Another reason for the proposed annex is due to the low number of AGR members that will be on the Interfraternity Council (IFC) rolls for next year. There is currently a large group of men graduating that will be taken off the rolls, but there will only be room for 23 new members. The following segments taken directly from the Annex Proposal will help illustrate the current situation.

In August, 2010, we had 104 AGRs on the IFC rolls. At the end of the fall semester 11 graduated (or were removed from the rolls due to grades) and two left the university leaving our numbers on January 1, 2011 at 91. This spring, we anticipate 18 will graduate or will move to fifth year status, and we project that we will lose two to attrition. We already have one brother who has announced he will not be returning. This will leave us with a total of 71 men on the IFC rolls as of June 2011. A summary of this is below:

Of the 71 on the rolls, 48 will be in-house undergraduates who will be living in the Chapter house for the fall of 2011. Twenty-three will be out-of-house seniors or fifth year undergraduates who are eligible for transition/alumni status. With a house capacity of 71 and 48 returning, this leaves room for only 23 potential new members. Adding these 23, our IFC rolls would be at 94. We traditionally lose one to two men from each new member class, so our rolls could be as low as 92.

An annex would allow us to sign up to eight additional new members for the fall semester. Currently, we have identified two apartments on the southwest corner of Third and Jefferson (southwest of the back lot) which are available and would each hold four men. The cost to lease the apartments is \$500/mo. each. If we could lease these, or similar properties in the *immediate vicinity* of the Chapter House as an annex, it would allow us to sign eight additional men this fall.

The following are our proposed guidelines for an annex:

- If an annex was leased, it would be extremely important to ensure that the same rules that apply in the Chapter House would also apply to the annex. We would implement a rule that the executive team do random checks of the property. The VNR Planning would decide these random checks, and the brothers living in the annex would have no prior warning. In the event of a violation, those involved would be sent to Standards Board with a minimum punishment of social probation and forfeiture of any possibility of living in the annex again.
- All brothers would only be allowed to live in the annex for one consecutive semester. The Chapter would also mandate that all brothers living in the annex complete the same requirements as everyone else, including house cleaning, homecoming hours, philanthropy events and other occasions that arise.
- The rooms in the annex would be part of the current room pref process—those with the highest GPA get first choice of room picks.

The following is our explanation of the quality/quantity issue:

- Our current issue is not getting quantity over quality; our current issue is ensuring we have the quantity of quality men to help us be competitive in all campus activities. While homecoming continues to be our main focus as a house, we have also become more competitive in other campus activities. In addition, there has been an increased emphasis placed upon philanthropic activities. Each Greek living group has at least one major event, and in order for them to participate in ours, we feel we must reciprocate. That said, with only 90-95 men on the rolls, it is becoming more difficult for us to participate in all of the activities and still concentrate on academics. With more men to spread the activities among we feel it will help our overall GPA. While both the advisers and the alumni have told us we need to “prioritize” our activities, it is very difficult to tell other houses that we will not help them but still expect them to help us.

UNDERGRADUATE MEMBERS PROPOSE ANNEX (CONT.)

- This is an issue that we would *evaluate each year* based on space availability in the house and the anticipated pool of high quality potential new members. For the fall of 2011, it appears we should not have a problem signing a quality pledge class of 30-32. This is what we signed last year, and we got a great group full of quality guys. If the numbers look different or the pool is smaller next year, the leasing of additional space gives us the option of not requesting an annex in future years.
- We are only interested in an annex if it is immediate vicinity of the Chapter house. We want those who live in the annex to be a part of the all house



activities including house cleaning, chapter meetings, meals, etc. An annex not in the immediate vicinity would not be desirable.

The proposal for the annex did not pass but it is an issue many undergraduates feel is necessary to maintain AGR as a top house on campus. The emphasis on campus involvement and philanthropy increases each year in the selection of awards. We already have fewer members than many other male houses; it increasingly becomes harder to win these awards. The undergraduate members understand and respect the concerns of the alumni involving a potential annex, and they appreciated the opportunity to be able to present this proposal.
